News from the National Trust: The Kerdroya project

This year was the 60th anniversary of the Cornwall AONB, which they celebrated with the Kerdroya project. Kerdroya was designed to celebrate the Cornish hedge as well as its role in the AONB landscape alongside involving our local communities in this process and delivering training and tourism benefits to Cornwall and local people. The National Trust hosted one of their events on the cliffs near Hawkers hut, Morwenstow; the project put on a talk, hosted a visit from St Marks school and had an open day for people to 'have a go' with a professional hedger. The repaired section of wall is just south of Hawkers hut, and is marked with a labyrinth shaped plaque, inspired by the Labyrinth found at Rocky valley near Tintagel.

FURTHER DETAILS OF ST JAMES CHURCH FURNITURE

The people and families appointed to specific seats paid an annual rent (that continued some centuries), it follows that many or all chose the design for their pew end. There may have been suggestions to choose like a pattern book. There are 4 main categories, vis heraldic with a coat of arms which was as good as any surname; several have their own initials (in the absence of heraldry) eq. S.S. which was surely for Sosthenes Sharsell of Houndapit farm; artistic designs, sometimes having stylised scrolls and grotesques; and arguably the most important 'religious emblems' mainly concerning the Christ at Easter story. By the time of the list which I suggested may date 1607 people seem to have been placed by importance or influence in the parish, eq. John Gist and Phillip Wadland were appointed to sit together in the front seat against the north wall. Maybe they were good friends, I have not discovered they were related. If the pew design is in its rightful place, they at least did not choose initials ! Mr. Wadland was an independent man with his own land and homestead at Hillpark, so he was not tied to the Grenvilles as a tenant.

Of special interest is the pew showing a Rose and a Thistle together, for the year 1603 when James 6 of Scotland became James 1 of England. The thistle looks more like a shaving brush! The rim of the oak planks also have a wide variety of designs, some the fashion of their time, others foliage, and different in the quality of carving; some no doubt carved by the Master and others by his apprentice. The Masters skills would always cost more. We have no record if they all came from the same workshop and it is likely they were produced outside the parish by specialists. Stratton employed a famous westcountry chap from Northlew.

Within a little booklet I own the late Canon A.C.Thynne says how the church was very dilapidated in 1858 and his father, the Rev. Lord John Thynne, vowed to improve it. All down the north side were "loose boxes" as if for stables. More correctly we should call them box pews. Such things survive along the north wall in Launcells church, each has a door, the sides are guite high, and they vary in size as if for families. They may have been provided as early as the 18th century. There were a few such at the back of Thurdon Chapel which was new built in 1840. Some decades back the late Rev. Ron Watts carving reused. The massively thick book rests trouble me, they are far too strong for that purpose; besides few folk owned a hymn book in the distant past more likely a little prayer book. The custom was to kneel on a hassock or toit to pray (a toit was a sewn coil of thick straw rope). If we kneel to pray we can rest our elbows on the stout bar of wood, and use the same to rise again, especially when stiff about the knees or infirm. The same applies to women wearing long skirts and petticoats.

Along the front of the pews, both left and right of the central aisle are 6 panels, they were all carved anew at the restorations of 1860. A divider on the north side seems to be older

The book for review at the August meeting was:-The Garden of Evening Mists by Tan Twan Eng.



Holiday Nature Notes from SARDINIA - M. Dingle

Sardina is the second island down on the left of Italy as you look at the map. It has wonderful beaches and stunning mountains which we walk/scrabble up. lots of little fishing villages along the coast and traditional villages and small farms inland. Their language is basically Italian with a Sardinian twist! On our fifth(!) visit we stayed in the north east near the village of San Panteleo..

Sardinia is part of Europe. so we weren't surprised to find our garden birds and there were Goldfinches. Chaffinches. Blackbirds and Warblers. On our fiirst evening we were treated to an amazing display from a large flock of Swifts and Swallows screeching down over the valley No 'morning chorus' but an evening serenade of Blackbirds and Warblers. There were few raptors (birds of prey) but we saw Buzzards and Kestrels occasionally. Oleanders. Bougainvillea. Geraniums and Latanas in shades of Crickets and grasshoppers were everywhere. Three different species of ants from tiny to enormous and at night a 3 inch long, bright green bullfog kept us entertained. The bugs loved the Latanas and so did the Humming Bird Hawk Moths Butterfly. Of course we had the usual Lizards and us and on the last morning we met the resident tortoise!

On our walks in the mountains we walked through the macchia which is a combination of wild Myrtle. Sages. Thymes. Rosemary. Tree Heathers. Cistus. wild Olive trees. wild Lillies and around houses in the mountains. Prickly Pear Cactus which was in full yellow flowered bloom. On top of Monte Molo we found a wild miniature rock garden with Gentians. wild Pinks. Thyme. Hawks-head. Tiny Rock Roses. pink Cistus. Sea holly. Heather and many more tiny blooms I could not identify. On this visit we also saw lots of big blue Dragonflies.

We revisited the resevoir near to last year's villa and were delighted to find it full of wildlife in the way of wild flowers. butterflies including Painted Ladies. pair of Great Crested Grebe who kept us entertained. red Damselflies and dragonflies. We also saw some rather unusual pink Dragonflies. With our 'agricultural' eyes' we noticed how much the vineyard had grown and were pleased to see the herd of white cattle still in the fields along with the three milking cows we talked to last year.

Recipe Corner With Maureen Hewlett

A few lovely savoury and sweet tarts for you to enjoy - and you don't even need to make the pastry!

Crab and Broad Bean Tart serves 6

Ingredients

and seeds removed

Savoury Custard:

2 whole eggs plus

3 egg yolks, beaten

Salt and black pepper

200g (7oz) milk

2 limes, zested and juiced

300g (10oz) double cream

1 pack shop-bought shortcrust pastry *Filling:* 200g (7oz) white crab meat 250g (8oz) podded broad beans 1 bunch coriander, picked and chopped

1 medium-sized red chilli, sliced with pith

Method

Heat the oven to 140°C (120°C fan, gas mark 1). Roll out the pastry to 3mm thick and line a 25cm tart ring. Prick the base, line with greaseproof paper and baking beans, then blind bake for 16 minutes. Remove greaseproof and beans, brush the base with some of the beaten egg yolk and return to the oven for another 6 minutes. Remove from oven and leave to cool.

For the custard, combine the cream, milk, eggs and the rest of the egg yolks and whisk until smooth. Pass through a sieve and season. Spoon the crab, beans, chilli and coriander into the tart case. Stir the lime juice and zest into the custard and pour into the tart case. Place in the oven for 18 minutes or until the custard is set. Remove from oven, leave to cool and serve at room temperature.

Heritage Tomato, Mozzarella and Pine Nut Tarte Fine serves 6

Ingredients

Butter for frying 1 pack ready-rolled all-butter puff pastry 3 red onions, peeled and thinly sliced Olive oil 2 sprigs of thyme, leaves picked 100g (3½ oz) grated parmesan 500g (1lb) selection of heritage tomatoes 1 ball mozzarella 25g (½ oz) basil leaves 25g (½ oz) coriander leaves (optional) 150g (5oz) pine nuts Sea salt A few rocket leaves to garnish

Method

Preheat the oven to 200°C (180°C fan, gas mark 6)

Melt a big knob of butter in a frying pan and cook the onions on a low heat until soft and caramelised – about 20 minutes.

Roll out the puff pastry into a square, rectangle or circle then turn over the edges to form a thin crust. Transfer to an oven tray lined with greaseproof paper.

Spread the cooked onions over the centre of the pastry, brush the edges with oil and sprinkle over the thyme and parmesan. Bake the tart for 15 minutes then leave to cool a little.

Cut the tomatoes into even wedges or slices then arrange neatly on top of the onions. Drain the mozzarella, tear into small pieces and use this to fill the gaps in the tart topping. Scatter the basil and coriander on top, followed by the pine nuts. Drizzle oil all over the tart and sprinkle with sea salt. Return the tart to the oven for 10 minutes then serve dressed with some rocket leaves to garnish.

Berry and Mascarpone Tart serves 6

Ingredients

1 pack shop-bought sweet butter pastry case

250g (8oz) tub of mascarpone cheese

2-3 tablespoons double cream

2-3 tablespoons chopped toasted hazelnuts

mixture of strawberries, raspberries and blueberries

Redcurrant jelly to glaze (optional)

Method

Stir the double cream into the mascarpone to loosen slightly, add the chopped hazelnuts and mix well. Spoon the mixture into the pastry case and smooth down. 
