Autumn words from Barn...

Occasionally, I say to myself, "Richard you are a bit of a worrier!"

I wonder if you are sometimes like me? First thing in the morning, just as I am waking up, all the things that must be done come racing up, just like hurdles in an athletic race. Must do this! Must do that! I am feeling shoved around willy nilly, by every little thing that has happened or might happen that day.

Well I got fed up with this - so I have started a new daily practice. In the morning while waking up and getting up, I pick out the pleasantest parts of the day ahead and I concentrate on them: I am going to enjoy a bit of breakfast with Lynne; walk the dog, even if it is raining; have a chat with friends and meet some nice folks when I go into the village. Talk to my children and grandchildren in NZ and Oz. Perhaps receive a letter from an old friend?

Yes, I am talking about all the "nice' things that could happen. It has been my experience that these always outnumber the ugly things like disappointments and frustrations, but in the past I have so often given precedence to those and forget entirely the good that occurs in our lives. So I have simply reversed the order. I have rewound the film so to speak, see the whole new day in a different light.

If you think yourself into a good day, in some way, every day becomes a good day. But as a Vicar, I should have known that this is "old news". If Jesus had been around two thousand years ago writing for the Kilk magazine, He would have said exactly the same thing. In fact He did:

"Therefore I tell you do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink... you can't add a single hour to your life by worrying about it". (Check it out in Matthew's Gospel chapter 6).

But of course that doesn't mean that bad things will never happen to you. What it means is that when they do, you will know that God cares about them and that you can talk to Him about whatever happens. And so, you can get up and get on with your day. G'day!

Hi to all you wonderful people of Kilkhampton. I don't know if you ever stop and think about it, but we all woke up this morning with our day planned; kids to get to school, get to work, get shopping done, or looking forward to a day out with the wife or friends. But we all have something planned, whether exciting or humdrum normal. And then we have our longer-term plans: to move house, or get a job or a different job, start a business, or perhaps get married. We take the freedom to plan all these things for granted. The freedom to live in this country or somewhere else in the world, for instance. I could go anywhere if I wanted to and yet that freedom was very dearly paid for with human lives, one of which was my dad's best friend, and another was a fuzzyhaired seven-year-old when I first knew him, but sapper Elijah Bond died from wounds sustained in Afghanistan, and now there is an empty chair at the Bond family table each Christmas so that I can enjoy mv freedom.

Jesus knew what it was like to grow up in an occupied country with all its restrictions and lack of freedom. It reminded me of what He said at the Last Supper "Do this in remembrance of me" and we do remember the sacrifice that Jesus made for us to have eternal life with Him as we take Holy Communion.

We also stop on Remembrance Sunday for just a minute to remember the cost of our freedom, because if we don't remember that cost and learn from it, then the danger is that history will repeat itself. Remember the world war of 1914 to 1918, the "war to end all wars" it was called, and history repeated itself in less than twenty five years. So let's join together this year on Remembrance Sunday to remember the past and learn from it, but also to remember what Jesus taught us "to love your neighbour as ourselves" and we have the freedom to do just that.

The book for review at the October meeting was:-The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time, by Mark Haddon

This is a murder mystery novel like no other. The detective, and narrator, is Christopher Boone. Christopher is fifteen and has Asperger's Syndrome. He knows a great deal about maths and very little about human beings. He loves lists, patterns and the truth. He hates the colours yellow and brown and being touched. He has never gone further than the end of the road on his own, but when he finds a neighbour's dog murdered he sets out on a terrifying journey which will turn his world upside down.

The book is sad but skilfully avoids any sentimentality. It is beautifully written and riveting.

Here is a new regular feature - Nigel and Alison Cousins (Penstowe Road) regularly go out and about and thought it might be nice to share some of their favourite places and recommendations. Of course, we would also welcome submissions from others of places to visit - you too can have your name 'in lights'! I'll let Nigel introduce himself...

Hi everyone. With these forthcoming articles, I am hoping to write about some of the places we visit in the South west of England, ones that you can travel in a day, but may be further afield in the future. Please note these are our opinions, but I want to encourage people to visit these places, to form their own views.

NIGEL'S TRAVELS to ... TOTNES

The first place I am going to talk about is Totnes in South Devon, and in particular travelling this time on the South Devon Railway from Buckfastleigh Station. There is a special offer, on the weekend of the 2nd & 3rd November, of half price travel. We travel the line probably about 3 or 4 times a year, mainly to support the railway for future generations; we are not true enthusiasts, but appreciate without these people, a lot of our heritage would be lost. For more information about the railway please look on their website www.southdevonrailway.co.uk

The journey can be spectacular, especially when there has been constant heavy rain, because the route runs alongside the river Dart, and flows very quickly, forming small rapids over the river bed. It consists of around seven miles of track, through some stunning countryside.

When we arrive at Totnes station from Buckfastleigh we walk in to town alongside the river, taking around 20 minutes. You can also travel to Totnes via Plymouth, by car or bus, another route is via Dartmoor National Park, if you prefer a more scenic route. I believe the best days to visit Totnes are the market days on Friday and Saturday. One of the main reasons I enjoy visiting the town, is because you see people from a wide cross section of society. There are many independent shops selling new and used clothing, antiques and curios, book shops etc. all there for you to discover. For more information go to www.visittotnes.co.uk

You have a very wide choice of places to eat or drink, we normally go to Anne of Cleves in Fore Street, a traditional tea room, or more recently we have used Young Devon No3 café and kitchen, also in Fore Street. They help fund projects for young people within Devon.

If we have travelled by car we very often park at Steamer Quay, this is where you can catch the river boats that travel to Dartmouth, or include it in the Round Robin tour. It is also a place you can walk by the river or sit watching the wildlife, or even the rowing club training on certain days. These are just some ideas; the best way is to walk around town and the surrounding area to discover this for yourselves.

Recipe Corner With Maureen Hewlett

Beef and Mushroom Pie with Pickled Walnuts serves 6

Courtesy of the Fordwich Arms, a Kentish pub.

Ingredients

Method

1¹/₂ tbsp plain flour 1kg (2lbs) stewing steak, diced into 3cm (1inch) cubes 3-4 tbsp sunflower oil 4 carrots, diced 2 onions, diced 150g (5oz) chestnut mushrooms, guartered 1¹/₂ tbsp tomato puree 200ml (7 fl oz) ale 100ml (31/2 fl oz) red wine $300 \text{ml} (10\frac{1}{2} \text{fl oz})$ beef stock 2 tsp Worcestershire sauce 5 thyme sprigs, leaves picked 1 x 390g (14oz) jar pickled black walnuts 1 x 500g (1lb) block puff pastry 1 egg, beaten, to glaze

Preheat the oven to 160°C (fan 140°C, GM3) Season the flour generously then toss with the beef to coat. Heat 1 tbsp oil in a casserole dish and fry the beef in batches until brown, using more oil as needed. Add the carrots, onions and mushrooms to the pan with a little oil and cook until the veg starts to colour. Return the beef to the casserole, add the tomato puree and cook for 3 mins stirring. Drain the pickled walnuts and cut into quarters. Add the ale and red wine, stirring well to mix in all the caramelised bits on the bottom. Add the stock, Worcestershire sauce, thyme and walnuts, bring to a simmer, cover and cook in the oven for about 2 hours or until the beef is tender. The liquid should be a thick glossy sauce. Transfer the stew to a 2 litre capacity pie dish and leave to cool completely before adding the pastry lid.

Preheat to oven to 220°C (fan180°C, GM6) Roll out the pastry to slightly larger than the pie dish. Brush the rim with a little beaten egg to help the pastry stick. Put the pastry over the dish ad press onto the edge, trimming off any excess. Glaze with the beaten egg and make a steam hole, then bake for 45 mins or until the pastry is golden brown and crisp.

Tiramisu Cake

Method

Preheat the oven to 180°C (160°C fan, GM4). Grease 2 x 20cm (8 inch) sandwich tins and line the bases.

Combine all the ingredients for the soaking liquid and put on one side. Place the eggs and sugar in a large bowl and whisk for about 5 mins until the mixture is pale and thick. Sift over the flour and fold in gently using a metal spoon or spatula. Dissolve the coffee in the hot water and stir into the mix.

Divide the mixture between the two sandwich tins, tilting the tins to level the surface, bake for 20-25mins or until golden and springy to the touch. Turn the tins out onto a baking rack, remove the paper, brush the soaking liquid over the cakes and leave to cool completely.

Place the mascarpone cheese into a large bowl and beat until smooth, gradually beat in the double cream and icing sugar to make a smooth and creamy icing. Place one sponge, soaked side up on a serving plate, cover with half the icing, top with half the grated chocolate then put the second cake, soaked side down on top. Cover the top with the remaining icing then top with the remaining grated chocolate.

Ingredients

For the cake: 4 large eggs 100g (4 oz) caster sugar 100g (4 oz) self-raising flour 1 tbsp instant coffee granules 1 tbsp boiling water butter for greasing

For the soaking liquid: 50ml (2 fl oz) brandy 3 tbsp freshly prepared coffee 3 tbsp boiling water

For the icing:

2 x 250g tubs full fat mascarpone cheese 150ml (5 fl oz) double cream 3 tbsp icing sugar, sifted 4 tbsp grated plain chocolate (at least 50% cocoa solids)
