FROM ST JAMES CHURCH

Dear friends,

It strikes me that we are all trying to get back to a bit of normality following the Covid pandemic, but there is something not quite normal about where we find ourselves.

The pandemic is still of course hovering in the background, but since we got most of our freedom back other issues have come to the fore. There is the dis-ease at the cost-of-living rises, the alarm of the war on Ukraine by Russia, fear of food shortages and the climate change crisis has not gone away.

We have of course had the recent delight of celebrating the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, which was a joy, but has only been a temporary relief from the anxieties and uncertainties that are all around us. So what do we do? And where do we turn?

I recently attended a Bishop's Study Day entitled "Let all creation praise the Lord", which was all about our commitment as a Diocese to care for creation. We, humanity, have miserably failed to care for creation and the church has failed to lead and teach our first calling by God to till and keep or work and take care of the Earth, together.

God called Adam and Eve, together, to till and keep the Earth as a song of praise to the Creator. God gave humanity dominion over the Earth; but sadly, we misinterpreted dominion as domination. We turned away from loving God and instead pursued our own self-interest. We eat from the tree of knowledge (the *one* forbidden fruit); we chose

knowledge over wisdom. We pursued greed and power in our selfishness. But as we did this, we wrecked all that God had set up for us; the way to live, the way to share, the way to relate, the way of abundance, the way of joy & peace.

Our failure to love God first spoils all these things, the tilling became hard toil, the keeping became a curse, the together became family break-up, our turning away from God became division between poor and rich, and warfare. The way we treated one another eventually became reflected in the land – and now our pillaging of the land is turning this wonderful earth against us. The temperature is increasing, floods and droughts, poor/no harvests and destroyed homes, extinction of flora and fauna are the result – and so we seek a little bit of normality.

God's way is one of love and forgiveness. Forgiveness does not come alone. It is not a case of - Repent and Carry On! When Jesus forgave the adulterous women he said, your sins are forgiven, go and sin no more.

And so, we need to repent. See what we are doing wrong & stop doing it. We need to once more cherish creation by cutting carbon (drastically) & to speak up. If we are to lift the curse then we need to seriously return to tilling and keeping creation together, so that creation might return to its original calling to praise God and humanity to treating one another well – and then the glorious normality shall return.

FROM KILKHAMPTON CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP

This is our usual double-up for July and August, our summer holiday, but it seems as though this year has had more breaks than usual. I suppose that with the Queen's Jubilee and with the media coverage it's seemed a long time, but it's come and it's gone and we are still here because life goes on, doesn't it.

I have been looking at Matthew 5, with the Beatitudes at the beginning of the chapter, and then I started to look at verses 13–16 again. So, get your Bible out and have a read.

I sometimes get asked "what should a Christian be?" well, Jesus starts verses 13 and 14 the same way. He said "You are". Not, "I would like you to be, or you ought to be, or on a good day you are, or fifty per cent of you could be." He said "You are." What a responsibility! But He also said that if salt loses its ability to be salt (i.e. to preserve and to enhance the flavour of) it is worthless, it is of no use at all! Again, what a responsibility! It made me think. When people leave my presence do they leave with more flavour or less, are they enhanced by being in my presence? Do I add to them or do I take away? Because if you add salt to a dish it brings it alive. Is that what people think when they leave my presence? Sobering questions! But Jesus said if that's not the case, we are useless, because if people have left us not feeling that they have been added to and built up by being around us, we have to ask, "why not?"

We are the salt of the earth and we are the light of the world, and that's because Jesus is alive in us. So, remember, it's not that "you might be" it's "YOU ARE". So, go into the world as salt and light because this world needs you now!



I will write again in the next newsletter and maybe I will see you at the village fete on 1st July, when I will be seeing many of the school children involved as part of the fete royalty and their attendants.







beings in Afghanistan and then to ship the deadly product to the USA. The story has many sub-plots and they all tie together somehow - a murder in a small motel in New York with all traces wiped out, another murder (disguised as a suicide) in Istanbul, Turkey... A telephone signal originating in Afghanistan alerts CIA that something is cooking. An expert is dispatched there and he starts discovering many alarming things. I should not give the plot away too much. All I would say is that the writing style is very good, characters are likable and the story develops nicely. There was some slowdown ²/₃ of the way when the hero seems to spend too much time in Turkey trying to solve a local murder/suicide. The end was very gripping. For the lovers of political thrillers and high-tech investigating tools, it is a very good book.

It is a big book with 800+ pages, but be warned - set time aside - take it on holiday. You will not want to put it down, it is a real page turner.

St. James Church Tower open day

By popular demand the bellringers (with the help of volunteers) will open the Church

Tower to the public on Saturday 23rd July for one day only. There will be a small charge of £3 for adults, and £1.50 for children (who must be accompanied by a responsible adult). This is a unique opportunity to view the church clock workings, observe how one of our eight bells is rung and, weather permitting, go to the top of our tower for far-reaching views of the coast and surrounding countryside. Numbers in the tower at any one time have to be limited so some queuing is inevitable on the day. The tower will be open at 9am and will close at 5.30pm approx. There are 96 steps to climb and whilst every care will be taken, you will take the trip at your own risk.

Refreshments will be available throughout the day so bring your binoculars and camera and enjoy the experience.

Interested in the ancient art of campanology (Bell-ringing)?

In common with most churches in the area and further afield, we are finding it difficult to find a full team of bell-ringers, often we "borrow" ringers to maintain the service at St James.

There may well be newcomers to the area who have been bellringers where they came from who have not yet come to visit us. You will be most welcome! Imagine seeing this photo in a gallery where it stretches almost from floor to ceiling. It draws you in transfixed as you gaze at all the detail. It is so easy to wander through wonderful buildings or glance and move on through photographs, but Ahmet Ertug's talent for composition and detail stops you in your tracks.

Ahmet Ertuğ trained as an architect in London in 1974, but since winning a fellowship to research traditional architecture in Japan, his love of photography has overridden his desire to draw. Now he shares his reverence for great buildings and archaeology with people around the world through his exhibitions and the internet: <u>Vanishing Point - a Photographic Opera in Four</u> <u>Acts by Ahmet Ertug (vanishingpointbyahmetertug.com)</u>

Recipe Corner

Summer fruit bread pudding

With summer nearing, and soft fruits about, what better idea than to make a fruit pudding. I first tried this in Bakewell. I was never a fan of frangipane so I went for an alternative dessert choice and it was amazing. This needs to be prepared the day before eating.

Ingredients

ripe apples)

150 ml rum

1 litre apple juice

Zest of 1 lemon

1 vanilla pod

200 g brown sugar

30 ml balsamic vinegar

1 loaf thick sliced white bread

Strawberry flavour jelly cubes

Pot of clotted cream to serve

1 kg of a mixture of soft fruits (a mixture of any of the following:

raspberries, blackberries,

cherries and figs, with some

Method

Prepare the fruit by simply cutting or breaking them up so they are almost universal in size. Add the apple pieces to the apple juice, then warm this mixture up to a simmer.

Put the sugar, rum, lemon zest, balsamic vinegar and vanilla into a bowl with the rest of the fruit and mix, lightly squashing some of the fruit.

In the meantime cut the crusts off the bread, and roll the slices with a rolling pin. Have your dish or bowl lined with cling film ready to build the pudding. Once the apples are soft, strain them out and put them into the fruit mix. Let the juice cool and use this to make the jelly. I like to set my pudding firm so always use double the amount of jelly cubes to liquid. Finally, strain the liquid from the fruit (if any) and add this to the jelly liquid.

I like to build it differently, a bit like a lasagne. Bread first, then berries, then bread and so on, pouring a little liquid on each layer. Once the dish is full, add in the remaining liquid and cover with cling film. Place a weight on top to compress it down and to make sure all the air is out and the jelly penetrates. Leave to set overnight and serve with clotted cream. Enjoy.

Pink gin cocktail (with accompanying salami and cheese board)

Recently while working in Fowey, I got invited to join some friends on their boat. I have always been a fan of cured meat boards and cheese. Here's a cocktail they made that I thought was perfect and easy.

Ingredients

1 chamomile tea bag 100 ml pink gin 100 ml spiced rum 100 ml elderflower cordial 100 ml pink grapefruit juice Ice Thyme sprigs, to garnish

Method

First brew the chamomile tea bag with 500 ml boiling water, steep for 2-3 minutes or follow the pack instructions. Remove the bag and leave to cool for 5 minutes.

Pour into a large jug with the pink gin, rum, elderflower cordial and juice. Add ice and stir, then add the thyme sprigs and stir again before serving.

For the cheeses, not all cheese will work with this, so avoid cheddars and blue cheese, instead go for fruity and hard cheese such as Spanish Manchego. Spicy salami and stuffed peppers are a good addition to the cheeseboard.

Good evening and welcome to all by Chairman. Chairman began the AGM meeting by passing over to the Clerk. The Clerk then requested nominations from the Councillors for the Chairman's position. KB nominated CV to remain as the Chairman and IH seconded. All in favour for CV to continue.

Thanks to all by the Chairman.

The Chairman began by speaking about the election of officers. All to remain the same. TC proposed and IH seconded. All in favour of the below:

Lamb Park Trust Committee: CV, TC, RH and IH School Representative: LB

Footpath Committee: PS and IH

Transport and Traffic Committee: RH, KB, TC and KO

Grenville Rooms: RH, IH and CV

Solar Farm: CV, TC and RH

Chairman mentioned that we have looked at 53 planning applications over the last year. Concerns about how we allocate money to projects and can't get them moving forward quick enough. Stated we have sorted the defibrillator thanks to KO.

Planning Applications.

1) PA22/04603 Proposal Retrospective application for the erection of rainwater harvesting shelter (resubmission of Application No. PA22/00523) Location Land North West Of Aldercombe Cottages Kilkhampton Bude EX23 9RP Applicant Mr and Mrs Field. Plans discussed. A return of the same application. We refused last time and nothing has changed. LB questioned the nature of their business. IH asked if subject to agricultural conditions as you need a certain amount of land if so. RH reiterated we refused last time. KO questioned why they need this when there is a lake there. RH unsure on what they actually own. KO said a roof of that size doesn't seem to be large enough for an alpaca farm. IH proposed refusal and VJ seconded. All in favour of refusal on the basis that the Parish Council cannot see a business plan that makes this viable and would request a detailed plan to be brought to the Parish Council.

2) PA22/04604 Proposal Retrospective application for the erection of an alpaca shelter (re-submission of Application No. PA22/00520) Location Land North West Of Aldercombe Cottages Kilkhampton Bude EX23 9RP Applicant Mr and Mrs Field|. LB proposed and TC seconded all in favour of refusal as above application.

3) PA22/04967 Land West Of Roseville Bude Cornwall EX23 9RZ. Kilkhampton Conversion/change of use of a barn to a dwelling, together with the demolition of existing extension and erection of replacement extension, together with glazed link between the extension and the barn. Plans discussed and viewed in detail. Can only look at what is in front of the Parish Council. Can't say it must be linked to the cottage. LB felt it could be continuous development. RH said the footprint is there already. RH proposed and TC seconded, all in favour of approval in principal provided the planning officer is happy with the current building being suitable for conversion and complies with planning regulations.

Matters

1. Car park and Toilets: £159.40 taken. No issues.

2. Lamb Park Development: No further forward. Nothing heard from anyone. Clerk to email asking when Paul Finn Solicitors will be able to move forward.

Pre-school building – VJ sourcing further quotes for groundwork. Hoping quotes will be in this week. Chairman asked if secured a building yet. VJ said they have had a quote that they are happy with. Until they have spent the money they have received so far, they can't apply for any more. Costs have gone up by approximately £90,000. Different proposals to be discussed with all parties for other ideas if needed. Committees to meet.

3. Skate park maintenance: KO had letter from company that supplied the skatepark originally. To replace surface on half pipe, 2 platforms and shipping, transport and labour comes to approximately £10,000. Flat roof company has had a look. Needs a particular resin. KO to push for flat roof company to quote. Chairman feels we need to

try and maintain what we have as those costs are far too high.

4. Queens Jubilee: Thanks to all and IH especially for all the organising. IH said a lot of help given behind the scenes. Chairman felt it had catered for everyone. VJ said it was a great day. IH had details of the over costs etc. Chairman said the big breakfast worked extremely hard. TC proposed that any profits be put back into the community funds. Not a charitable event and all money should come back into the community. Refund from the Jubilee event to return to the Parish Council for allocation within the Parish.

5. Parish documents/storage: Chairman said this relates to the Jubilee also, as lots of documents and photos were there for viewing. These now need to be stored. Others want to put on another event to bring all documents etc for viewing and to be digitally stored. All important documents need to be locked away safely. RH said maybe put something at Lamb Park permanently. IH mentioned Mr Heard, and if we needed to discuss with him. Chairman said yes we will need to confer with Mr Heard. Photographic exhibition to be put onto agenda per Chairman. KB said we would have to know whose documents they were and have their permission.

6. Councillors' emails: Chairman said we will have Mr Westlake at a meeting if necessary. No need to have separate emails as we have enough communication.

7. Other matters arising from the minutes: None

Footpaths: IH will sort cutting in next couple of weeks.

Playing Fields and Lamb Park: Chairman mentioned someone is coming over to advise on what to do with the play area. VJ in discussions with Gerald Strong regarding this. May need to be a 3 year project as everything is so expensive. TC mentioned the marquee on the playing field. IH will sort anything necessary. To be kept there until fete is finished.

School: LB stated nothing to report.

Grenville Rooms: Nothing to report per RH.

Month's work: Read through and approved by all.

Members

KO – The defibrillator had been taken. Had been asked to put down when the pads run out – we don't have any spare sets. When used they have to be thrown away. KB said it was taken out of the cabinet but not used. Notice to be put in cabinet by KO. Chairman questioned why one defibrillator company needs a contract and charges and the other one doesn't. TC asked if the one at the MOT station is telephone-activated? Apparently not anymore. RH read email re: defibrillator installed at the MOT station. Extra charges explained regarding internet connection and waivered connection fee. Also fitting one at Bunnyhomes. RH and Chairman both felt we don't want to take on the maintenance of that one. Make note to look into the contract of the one at the MOT station in Feb/March next year. Chairman felt if someone has an application in - it is up to them to look into when it will be discussed etc. RH stated that another Parishioner spoke to him about this same application and was upset we turned it down. RH reiterated to them we made the decision on the information we had been given at the time. This application was down to the land agent to decide. LB did also state that there is a public speaking session at every meeting which anyone is welcome to come to.

Chairman mentioned we had received an email about residential development and requested some name suggestions. Their suggested names were Westland Mews and Westland Close. KB proposed "Westland Close", IH seconded and all in favour. LB felt Mews was usually associated with stables.

Chairman said email we had re: child poverty from the action group and what our actions plans were. LB mentioned again we are one of the highest areas of child poverty. Chairman read through the email with details of what Poundstock have done. Chairman mentioned they are asking for our support. Clerk to reply saying we support the motion put forward by Poundstock Parish Council. KO moved and VJ seconded. All in favour.

Chairman mentioned that there were some loose stones noticed when putting bunting up. RH to look into.

TC, IH, VJ, KB, RH – Nothing.

Email read through by the Chairman from Kilkhampton School PTA requesting funding for reading support. Chairman said we have a no donations policy. LB mentioned they have funding. VJ said she understands the no donations policy but feels since COVID, literacy is a major concern with schools and would really help. Clerk to reply

THE MEANING OF 'KILKHAMPTON'

Being interested in language, I was fascinated Mike by Carpenter's research that unravelled various corruptions of the word "Kilk" through the ages, and showed the vibrant history of our village. The word Kilk (or more commonly Kirk in Ireland and Scotland) was often used by Celts to denote a small early cell or circle of Christians that began to form before the established church, (church being another heavily corrupted mutation of this word). The speculation that I book "Unveiling outlined in my Morwenna" ISBN 978-0-9571875-6-6. is that in the early 6th century Morwenna founded a small Christian mission community here in Kilkhampton, linked to Morwenstow and Marhamchurch. Elsewhere in the UK Kirkmichael, Kilmartin. Kirkpatrick, Kirklees, Kilmarnock, Kirklington etc. suggest further connections with an early Christian cell.
