

ROBIN HOOD

"Continuing with the theme of word development, following Mike Carpenter's research into the name of our village for the June edition of the Parish News, I once investigated Robin Hood's name.

While building my family tree I came across the marriage of Sarah de Beuvil (born in Gunthorpe, Rutland circa 1120) to a John "de Hotot", and it made me realise Hotot must be the source of the surname Hood. After the Norman Conquest the Hotots were an influential family in Middle England, where they held much land and many manors. "Robert" was a Christian name regularly and frequently used by this family, with "Robin" then being an acceptable variant, and interchangeable with it.

In researching further I discovered that early on in the Middle Ages certain members of the Hotot family were having brushes with the law, particularly in connection with "forest offences". In 1162-63 a "Robert Hotot" owed 6s8d for a "forest offence", and in 1175-76 the heavy "forest eyre" showed a Thomas Hotot as owing 20s, - also for a forest offence. These details immediately conjure up images of Robin Hood and his Merry Men riding through Sherwood Forest.

Of necessity legends are full of poetic licence, but the story of Robin Hood is firmly fixed in the period surrounding the time of King John who reigned 1199-1216; burdensome taxes, tyrannical misuse of authority, rebellion of knights and barons, all relate to the late 12th and early 13th centuries. Online I then found an article by Dr Mike Ibeji to support these findings. This is part of his account:

"On 25th July 1225, the royal justices held an assize at York. When the penalties were recorded in the Michaelmas roll of the Exchequer, they included 32s. 6d. for the chattels of one Robert Hod, fugitive. The account was carried forward into the following year, when he had acquired the nickname of 'Hobbehod'. An epitaph recorded by Thomas Gale in 1702 recorded that a grave purporting to be that of Robin Hood lay at Kirklees (where the legend claims he was killed), dated to 1247."

I have been unable to persuade any academic of the Middle Ages, with their access to ancient documents, (or enthusiasts such as Tony Robinson,) to verify and expand my speculation.

TREE BOOK GROUP: Once Upon a River, by Diane Setterfield

At the Swan Inn on the banks of the Thames, the landlord has a reputation for storytelling. One Night, on the Winter Solstice, he is about to launch into a tale when a badly injured man staggers in carrying the apparent corpse of a little girl. However, some hours later, she awakes and the story rapidly spreads across the surrounding area of the child who died and came back to life. It is heard by the Vaughans, whose little girl Amelia was kidnapped two years previously. It is heard by Robert Armstrong, a mixed race farmer who is searching for the grand daughter fathered by his wayward son. It is heard by Lily White, housekeeper to a parson, who hides a deep guilt about events in her past. All three arrive to claim the mute child.

Once Upon a River is a story which stands on the cusp of myth and reason. Lily see visions of a dead child, the river folk tell stories of the Ferryman, a grey figure who saves from the river those whose time has not yet come, but who also ferries others "to the other side". The forces of reason opposing them are headed by Rita, a self taught medic and amateur scientist, and Daunt, a photographer.

The story which flows from these sources is one of blackmail and murder, of wicked step-siblings and benevolent parents, of spiritualism, fortune telling and illicit distilling, of late flowering love and of pig rearing.

The book's strongest suit is the plotting, which is intricate and satisfying, even if at least one loose end, relating to one of the lost children, is tied up a little too neatly and easily. The complexity of the plot is as it should be in a book whose main theme is storytelling.

The historical setting is never explicitly stated, I would guess at late Victorian, early Edwardian. One also gets a feeling of an author trying a little too hard to reproduce the 19th Century novel. Early on the building blocks of the story clunk a little too obviously into place as a sequence of chapters all end on the same note.

Finally, the characters tend a little towards the black and white, with motivations, particularly in the case of Helena, mother of Amelia, not ringing true. Overall it is an enjoyable, enriching read. It is part ghost story, part detective yarn, part thriller, and in the end a rather sweet love story. Above all, it is a nice book, with its heart very firmly in the right place. Ultimately, what the author has delivered is a cracking melodrama.

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BUDE LOOK GROUP

As our focus for September, we continued to ponder why so many artists choose to include trees in their work. We had all selected a wide variety of images by many artists through the ages. We concluded that some artists make us concentrate on a tree's details: we look closely at the texture of its bark, the gnarled knuckles of its roots, the way its branches spread and feel that we 'get to know' the tree – in the way that we gaze at portraits of people to work out what they might be like. So this is a kind of tree portrait. Some trees are used as symbols or to express ideas and make a point. In other artworks, impressions of trees focus on pattern or form or depictions of trees evoke atmosphere or feelings or illustrate part of a narrative. And sometimes the textures, shapes and patterns of trees are the inspiration for abstracts.

Constable loved trees. Here is my favourite story of an Ash tree in Hampstead that Constable told at a lecture in 1830s:

"Many of my Hampstead friends may remember this young lady at the entrance to the village. Her fate was distressing, for it is scarcely too much to say that she died of a broken heart. I made this drawing when she was in full health and beauty; on passing some time afterwards, I



saw, to my grief, that a wretched board had been nailed to her side, on which was written in large letters, 'All vagrants and beggars will be dealt with according to law.' The tree seemed to have felt the disgrace, for even then some of the top branches had withered. Two long spike nails had been driven into her side. In another year one half became paralysed, and not long after the other shared the same fate, and this beautiful creature was cut down to a stump, just high enough to hold the board."

Clearly, Constable was appalled at the insensitivity with which the tree had been treated. But he also seems to be saying that a society which has no love for trees also has no love for human beings – such as the poor woman and child sitting at its feet, one of the "beggars and vagrants" who will be "dealt with according to law"

13th September 2022

I write to you at the start of a brand new school year. We said goodbye to our nineteen Year Six pupils at the end of July, who are now attending Budehaven, Atlantic Academy and Holsworthy College for their secondary education.

On 7th September, we welcomed our twenty-six new pupils into the Reception class, Sandymouth. We have been busy electing house captains and selecting sports leaders, librarians, environmental representatives, mental health buddies and internet safety officers from our pupil body. On the subject of mental health buddies, I was really proud for the school to be featured on ITV News West Country for our offer on working to safeguard pupil mental health.

The start of the new school year has obviously been affected by the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. We held a special assembly to inform the children of her death in a sensitive and age-appropriate manner. Following on from that, we have changed the school's topics for a further two weeks to give the children the chance to learn about the momentous and historic changes to the realm with the accession of King Charles III and a new head of state for the first time in seventy years.

Recipe Corner

ECONOMY PASTA BAKE

Here's a quick meal, designed to use up any left-over bits you have. It makes for a great alternative to lasagne and you don't need exact quantities, just put in what you have or what you like the best!

Ingredients

Cannelloni pasta tubes
Olive oil
Half a white onion, diced
3 cloves of garlic, crushed
1 punnet of mushrooms
1 jar of tomato pasta sauce
Any left-over chicken, mince, fish or seafood (raw or cooked)
Chopped parsley
Chopped chives
Salt and pepper
Grated cheddar (or any cheese you need to use up)

Method

Heat the oven to 170°C, gas mark 3.

The idea of this dish is to make a filling, with mushrooms as the binder of the dish. Sauté the mushrooms with onion, garlic and parsley. Leave it to cool. Shred or chop your meat or fish and add this to the mushrooms. Season well. Add the parsley and chives. Feel free to add any other fresh herbs you have in your garden, or any vegetables you have grown or need to use up.

Once the filling is cooled, stuff the cannelloni tubes well and packed full. In a deep dish, lay out the filled pasta and cover with the sauce. You can add a splash of wine to the dish to loosen up the tomato sauce. Sprinkle the grated cheese on top, cover with foil or a lid and bake in the oven for 35mins. You should be able to cut through the pasta with a knife when it's cooked.

Remove the foil or lid and bake for another 10 minutes to colour the top of the dish.

Serve with a nice salad or some crusty bread and butter. Enjoy!

Good evening and welcome to all by Chairman.

Approved by all and to be signed by the Chairman at the end of the meeting.

Adopt Code of Conduct Declaration of Interest None Public Speaking Session

Mr Wong here to ask about the footpath by his and neighbouring properties. Asking whether they can do work on the pathway. Chairman advised it wasn't actually a footpath, as doesn't show on Cornwall Maps. Mr Wong stated they would like to carry out maintenance and needs to know who owns it. Chairman felt the Parish Council were unable to help. Felt it was an un-adopted right of way. Mr Wong informed there have been incidents where people have fallen. Asking if they would be doing wrong if they have to close it for maintenance. Chairman felt it would be ok for them to look after it, as it is hazardous as it stands.

Mr Wong also mentioned the plan for Kilkhampton Common and had been asked to consult with the Parish Council on whether there would be a consultation regarding this. RH said it would need to be something requested to us by Cornwall Council. Mr Wong said he had been advised to engage with the Parish Council and see a consultation put in place. Chairman asked for the Planning officer's name and then they can advise on how the Parish Council needs to proceed. Mr Wong to find name and forward on.
