From the Methodist Superintendent: Reverend Simon H Leigh

Trinity Sunday 2023

Dear One and All,

The great celebration of Easter and the festival of Pentecost have both now been and gone. Today as I write this letter, it is Trinity Sunday. This Sunday we remember that Christians know God, as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. This is sometimes rendered as God the creator, God the Redeemer of the World and God the Holy Spirit, our friend and guide, the inspiration of the Church. Collectively theologians refer to this as the economy or household of God; the amazing thing about this household is that there is a welcome for the likes of you and me. If one reads the extraordinary account in Genesis 18:1-8 concerning Abraham's encounter with what is interpreted as the three persons of the Trinity; there is a central message of the giving and receiving of hospitality, together with the wonder of an encounter with the fulness of God. The Russian artist, Andrei Rublev depicts this in his famous 15th century triptych, shown on the right.



I am always struck by the position of the characters and the space left open facing you and I. Here is the place of welcome and the place of hospitality. Hospitality is a risky and sometimes costly offering. The Church has always been seen as a place of refuge, a sanctuary, as a place where a welcome might be found. For the most part this is true and the Methodist Church has traditionally been a place of hospitality. Its people welcoming and offering kindness and so often this has been accompanied by extravagant generosity, particularly when this comes to food! However, at times that hospitality has been abused by those seeking it and those who provide it. The place at the table is open to all but comes with demands and expectations; it is a place of grace, but not cheap grace. Methodist theology reflects the link with salvation and grace in terms of responsible grace. Grace is unmerited and a gift from God. Salvation comes when 'Thou O' Christ, art all I want' and through the realisation that 'Plenteous grace with thee is found, grace to cover all my sin; let the healing streams abound make and keep me pure within; thou of life the fountain art.'

Our challenge is to be part of this therapeutic and salvific gift of grace and to exercise this gift responsibly. The place at the table is open to all and we will be constantly surprised at who accepts the invitation, as much as we are humbled to accept our invitation too.

BUDE LOOK GROUP

The current exhibition at Tate Modern is called Forms of Life and features the work of Hilma af Klint 1862-1944 and Piet Mondrian 1872-1944, so we thought we would choose these artists as our focus for June. Neither artist knew of the other and yet their lives seemed to run in tandem. Both were classically trained artists who initially focused on landscape, both were knowledgeable about biology and painted flowers throughout their careers, and both developed abstract art.

They lived at a time of great change: microscopes and X-rays opened up new worlds that had previously been invisible, telescopes were able to reveal a new cosmos and the world religions were adapting to a new understanding of evolution. Mondrian and af Klint were protestants and both studied Theosophy – a school of thought that believed knowledge of a deeper spiritual reality could be achieved through focused attention on intuition, meditation, and other means of transcending normal human consciousness. They believed in the connectivity of all life. For a time af Klint became a medium.

In 1911 Mondrian was able to travel to Paris where he was influenced by Picasso and Cubism. His *A tree* was one of a series of paintings where he aimed to distil a tree to its essential form. Eventually he was able to condense his work into the meticulously composed series of vertical and horizontal lines for which he is famous.

Mondrian understood abstraction as a process of approaching absolute truth and beauty.

Hilma af Klint was unable to leave Sweden where she looked after her mother which makes her contribution to art even more extraordinary. She was practising automatic writing and drawing decades before the surrealists. From 1906 she set about producing an enormous body of work that she dreamed would one day be displayed in a temple that celebrated the beliefs of Theosophy. Very few people were privy to these "Paintings for the Temple" and she stipulated that they should not be shown until twenty years after her death.

What is most extraordinary is that before her paintings in 1907 no one had ever created an abstract painting. Before her work was discovered, Kandinsky was thought to have produced the first abstract painting in 1910.



The Ten Largest 1907 explored childhood through to old age. Across ten canvases, each ten feet high, swirling shapes in soft pastel colours rhythmically interact with cursive letters, forming a kind of visual poem. Petals, ovaries, flowers and spirals pulsate in constant sparks of creation.

Both Mondrian and af Klint died in 1944. In their own ways, each artist was creating an abstract language that could express art's interconnectivity with all forms of life. Seen from today's perspective of environmental and planetary crisis, their close attention to such fragile relationships is even more relevant.

Recipe Corner

A couple of summer recipes for a barbeque, entertaining friends or simply enjoying with your family!

Caesar Salad Dressing (serves 2)

Ingredients

5 dessertspoons mayonnaise
1 dessertspoon white wine vinegar
1 small clove garlic, crushed
2-3 tinned anchovies, finely chopped
A handful of grated parmesan

Method

One of my favourites – simple and quick to make, the quantities can be adjusted to taste and of course scaled up for more people. It's worth keeping the mayonnaise to white wine vinegar quantities in line with each other – 5 quantities of mayonnaise to 1 quantity of white wine vinegar – but play around with the other ingredients as you like!

Simply mix the mayonnaise and vinegar together, add the garlic, anchovies and half the parmesan and mix – the anchovies and parmesan will dissolve into the mixture, leaving it relatively smooth.

Use as a salad dressing – for a Caesar salad, simply mix lettuce into your dressing, top with pieces of cooked chicken (if wished) and croutons, and sprinkle the remaining parmesan over the top to serve.

Barbeque Chicken Tikka

Ingredients

Boneless raw chicken – any kind Greek-style yogurt Curry paste – tandoori or madras Red food colouring (optional)

Method

As you can see, I haven't specified any quantities at all! Chop the chicken into chunks so that it can easily be threaded onto skewers. Mix the yogurt and curry paste together to suit your own taste – you can put quite a lot of curry paste to get a good flavour without being too spicy, so maybe something like 250ml yogurt to 2-3 tablespoons of curry paste. If you have red food colouring, add a small amount to make it look more authentic, but you can easily do it without. Marinade for at least 1 hour before cooking.

To cook on a barbeque, thread onto skewers, not too tightly, and cook until the outside is slightly charred and there is no pink inside the chicken (cutting the chicken into chunks means this doesn't take too long to cook). Alternatively cook in a pre-heated oven at 160°C temperature for around 45 minutes, stirring and turning halfway through cooking,

Good evening and welcome to all by the Chairman. Bude & Camelford Community Area Partnership (CAP) formally Bude Network Panel: RN and LB.

All happy to continue as listed - TC proposed and RH seconded.

The Chairman read through his yearly report. He also asked if the parishioner who had attended would like to talk - no. Thanks by the Chairman and concluded the AGM.

1. PA23/03311 Proposal To demolish the existing garage and rebuild as a one bedroomed dwelling Location Land North West Of Demellian Aldercombe Lane Kilkhampton Bude Applicant Mr Stuart Bryant. All confirmed they knew where this was situated. RN asked if it was much bigger. RH said it was more or less the same footprint.

RH gave description of work and pictures available for viewing. The Chairman said in the past we have

requested that these applications are tied in with the current dwelling and not sold off as a separate entity. RH couldn't see any grounds on turning this down, but did agree we should tie the bungalow. VJ confirmed we had also done this in the past. RH proposed we approve with conditions that it is tied to the dwelling and not sold off separately. KO seconded and all in favour.

- 2. PA23/03247 Proposal Application for roofing over livestock gathering area to prevent increased volumes of contaminated water that would require management and treatment. Location Darracott Farm Kilkhampton Bude Cornwall Applicant Mrs Julie Granger NJ, JA & SN Granger. Another section of same plan as received before. TC proposed, no objections, VJ seconded and all in favour.
- 3. PA23/03828 Proposal Application for Outline Planning Permission with some matters reserved for the demolition of stables and erection of single storey dwelling namely access and scale only. Location Dwelling At Lower Tamar Stables Kilkhampton Bude Cornwall Applicant Mrs Sandra Inott Gibbs. Pictures available for viewing of location etc. They are wanting to take the stables down and build a dwelling. Details given.

RN asked if planning on the stables in the first place. Yes. Not classed as sporadic due to buildings around already, farms, bungalows etc. The Chairman felt it could open up flood gates for other applications. TC asked if timber, yes. RN disagrees with the application. RN suggested we need to stipulate. TC stated not a permanent structure as it is a timber stable and shouldn't be removed to be replaced with a dwelling.

RN proposed we don't support on the basis of not agreeing with a timber structure being allowed to be replaced with a permanent residence. This could start numerous applications being made on that basis. TC seconded and all in favour of not approving the application.

4. PA23/02975 Proposal: Erection of one detached 3 bedroom dwelling, with associated vehicle access and landscaping Location: Land West Of Sunnyside East Road Kilkhampton Bude Cornwall EX23 9QS Applicant: Mr Adrian Clements. The original application had small parking facilities. This now has no parking on the amended application.

RH mentioned our comment on the previous application was that we were concerned with the parking. The Chairman said there is no policy that states a dwelling must have parking. KO feels we should still object to no parking at all. The Chairman had heard of other concerns also – namely how is it to be built where it is with regards to

construction/traffic etc. The Chairman felt we needed to be consistent.

Still have concerns with parking and also the position to the major junction on the A39 and construction/traffic issues. VJ mentioned that larger vehicles when turning there are virtually on this area as they travel round. VJ also mentioned that this plot had been for sale as an allotment previously. VJ felt a three bedroomed house lends itself to more than one car/vehicle.

KO asked if we could make suggestions to their parking issues/turning system? RH said we were concerned with the access and now they have come back with removal and car parking possibilities. IH proposed refusal due to the aforementioned issues and RN seconded. All in favour.

5. PA23/04357 | Application for Non-Material Amendment to PA18/06979 for the erection of four Dwellings, Garage and Access at land adjoining Priestacott Park, namely 1) Amendments to footprint. 2) Amendments to fenestration and roof forms. | Plot 4 The Ridgeway Kilkhampton EX23 9FT. Amendment – RH read through application. Technical points only. TC moved and PS seconded. All in favour. No objections.

Matters

- 1. Car park and Toilets: £172.50 taken. No issues.
- 2. Lamb Park (Glebe) Development: Lease all signed. The Chairman mentioned we need to agree a figure for Mrs H Bond. Mrs Bond did a huge amount of work for us and we had employed her as a consultant figure on our behalf once realising how much work was involved. The Chairman felt we would not have got to this signed lease agreement without the help of Mrs Bond. IH proposed £500. All in favour. £115.50 left to pay Paul Finn Solicitors. All these figures were allocated back 2 years ago when the process began.

Letter of thanks to be sent to Ms Emma Pearce for witnessing the documentation for us for free. The Chairman mentioned he has thanked her previously. Official final documents still to be received.

3. Lamb Park Play area: VJ managed to get funding for the roundabout. Decided to go with T K Play – they have been out numerous times and they seem great and very professional. Going with swings and roundabout first.

VJ feels happy with the process of T K Play. Ground will also be mainly matting. Should be starting within 6-8 weeks. Numerous recommendations came in for T K Play also. VJ mentioned the first sections are £33,000 approximately. Thanks to VJ from the Chairman.

4. Other matters arising from the minutes: None.

Reports

Footpaths: IH mentioned the first cut will be over the next couple of weeks. PS mentioned the tree at Kespitt – county have emailed back and said thank you for the information and that they will now be looking into.

Playing Fields and Lamb Park: Signed contract with Paul Cottle for the work to be done on the building. Everything we needed (apart from the dugouts). TC mentioned the fence by the disabled bay on the car park is rotted out. The Chairman said this is to be thought about.

School: In the absence of LB, VJ gave brief report.

Grenville Rooms: Quote received for work by K&J Building. Quote read through by the Chairman. Cost of £1300 (no vat) for the back room History storage area. TC proposed we move for this quote and PS seconded. All in favour. RH to speak to the electrician.

Month's work Read through and approved by all. **Members**

TC – noticed metal drain defected. The Chairman said there are now blue lines around this particular drain so is in hand with Highways already.

IH – Noticed how fast the traffic goes down Penstowe Road.

KO – A parishioner mentioned flashing light on the defibrillator – KO to look into.

RN – now the representative for the Bude and Camelford Community Area Partnership – Clerk to confirm this with Chris Simms and team and that RN will be attending the meeting on the 12th May. Mentioned the email we received about farming in the 1600s – read through by the Chairman and suggested we forward to Michael Heard for his assistance to them.

RH, PS – Nothing.

VJ – Asked where our sporting achievements board was. The Chairman mentioned they are at the football club waiting to be put up. The Chairman said we were unsure what the rules are for qualifying as we needed to update the information. To be on agenda for July meeting.

The Chairman mentioned a dead tree in Hillpark Lane. RH said Mr S Derosa has mentioned this one before. KO felt not on the edge that runs with the lane. Who do we contact to state it is dangerous? Suggestion of Forestry Commission given by RH. The Chairman is concerned it will fall onto the footpath. We need the professional company to view and then declare that is needs to be dealt with.

The Chairman is happy to meet someone and give contact information if required. KO asked about the

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one at the park entrance? IH not noticed any difference. Clerk to write to the Forestry Commission and mention a couple of trees in the village that we are concerned with, as in dangerous situations and would appreciate someone visiting and giving some advice.

Correspondence Cornwall Air Ambulance letter received and read through by the Chairman. Asking for donations. Clerk to reply with our policy of no donations. The village and members support in many other ways.

Finance Read through by Chairman. Invoices to be paid: £23.26 D & I Bridgman; £90.00 S Gifford: £480.00 Archie's Garden Services; £44.40 Bradworthy Glass (Stibb notice board); £159.40 Chubb Fire and Security. RH moved and VJ seconded. All in favour to be paid.

CELEBRATING THE CORNISH LANGUAGE

Hello (dyth da) all you lovely people in Kilk. I am a born and bred Cornishwoman, with my ancestors in this area dating back hundreds of years. I was born in Bude and now live in Kilk.

This month Jill and I thought it would be a good idea to write a few lines about the cultural revolution taking place in Cornwall nowadays. Along with all the traditional festivals, there is renewed interest in bringing back our language, especially when we don't hear our dialect spoken so often nowadays.

Cornish, or Kernewek, last spoken in the early 1900s in the west of Cornwall, is one of the 6 ancient Brythonic Celtic languages. The others are Welsh and Breton which are both very similar to Cornish, and then the three Gaelic languages: Irish, Scottish and Manx.

The Cornish language was only officially recognised by the UK government in 2002, under the European Charter for Regional or Minority Languages. Since then it has started to appear as part of the names or symbols of Cornish organisations, and also many street signs are now in both Cornish and English.

Kernewek or Cornish was listed under the European Charter for Regional or Minority Languages in 2002. Cornish is now taught in Exeter University and at its Penryn Campus. It is also taught in several schools further south in Cornwall, including some after-school clubs.

number There are an increasing opportunities to learn Cornish. Free mobile phone apps include Indylan, Clozemaster and uTalk, which can be fun to do. There are numerous casual chat groups - Yeth an Werin - available free, either on line or with opportunities to meet face-to-face with others. There are also more structured lessons online Cornwall Council beginners. Education offer beginner's courses either on line or face to face at the Gregson Centre in Stratton, which start in October each year.
