It's odd, typing 2024 when it's over 6 weeks away. I always feel like I'm 'living in the future' when I do the parish news, and I need to remember that it's still the month before all these events are happening - or for this issue, many of the events are two months away! This issue is full of nice celebratory events, many related to the festive season, and also we can look back at the Remembrance Day events, including photos.


On other topics – many of you know my husband, Mike Carpenter, had a stroke many years ago. When we first moved down here, we investigated what was available for people who have had strokes (the correct term is 'stroke survivors' but Mike hates that!). We found a small group in Bude, set up by the charity Connect which was a great place for resources to help with strokes, but that charity no longer exists and only 3 of the people who used to go to those meetings still stay in touch and meet for coffee. Cornwall has its own challenges including distance, Mike is in Kilk of course and the other two live in Tintagel and Launceston.

We also found a stroke group in Bideford, and through that we found a small group of people, with

strokes or Parkinson's disease, who met in Appledore once a month to sing sea shanties. As with strokes, some people with Parkinson's have difficulty with speech but find it easier to sing. Mike loved that group, but like many things it no longer exists. He and one of his Bude group friends are quite interested in meeting up and singing with others, and they wanted me to ask whether anyone might be interested in getting together as a small group in Kilk? Or is there anything else that exists that might be similar? If you are interested or have any information about existing groups, please get in touch with me – my contact details are on page 2.

I'm not too sure how many of you are interested in the Cornish language, but for those who are, I don't think it's too early to say 'Nadelik lowen ha blydhen nowyth da'!

I hope you all have a lovely Christmas and New Year, and see you in 2024!

KILKHAMPTON FESTIVAL OF REMEMBRANCE

On November 4th, the church bells of St James the Great rang out a muffled peal to welcome over 200 attendees to two performances of the bi-annual Kilkhampton Festival of Remembrance. The church was beautifully decorated and Colonel Roger Lawes welcomed one and all.


The festival started with the national anthem and Chivenor military ladies choir who sang 'The Poppy Red'. Standards of the Royal British Legion, Royal Naval Association, Royal Marines Association, Royal Air Force Association and Hartland RAF cadets were all represented and marched out. They were accompanied by service personnel from the Royal Navy, Royal Air Force, and the Rifles, REME and Parachute regiments of the Army. Together they formed a guard of honour for Chelsea Pensioner Brian Cummings, as Tamarside and Kilk church choir sang 'The Boys of the Old Brigade'.

The singing of 'I Vow to Thee My Country' resounded loudly, with Bude Metric Bandmaster Colin Gay taking charge, ably assisted by organist Brenda Luxton, as James Stacey processed the union standard to the front of the church.

The festival welcomed Plymouth Pipe Band, who played a set and were then followed by soloist Callum Flew. Tamarside singers and Kilk choir sang two beautiful pieces which then led on to Naomi Whittaker, whose son Private Joe Whittaker was lost in Afghanistan in 2008, leading the Act of Remembrance, accompanied by Lieutenant Colonel

Grice. Deacon Debbie Marsh led prayers with Reverend Teresa Folland and Simon Leigh, and the Act of Remembrance followed.

A lone piper stood in the bell tower and played the last post as the union standard was dipped, and two minutes silence was observed as poppies floated down from the rafters and fell silently on the parade below. The band played sunset and the final hymn was 'The Day Thou Gavest Lord Is



Ended' as once again poppies drifted down to the congregation, a very emotional and moving act of remembrance.


Parade Marshall Luke Francis BEM said "it is a privilege to put on the festival with over 100 people participating. With two performances, we seat over 400 people. There are just too many to thank individually but to think it has been enjoyed by so many, and raised over £4500 for the Poppy Appeal, makes it so worthwhile".

BUDE LOOK GROUP

At our latest meeting we focused on the Macchiaioli group of artists who met to discuss politics and art at the Café Michelangelo in Florence. This was the time of Garibaldi, the wars of independence in Italy and its subsequent unification in 1871. The artists resented the classical tuition they had received in their art academies, and thought the art world divorced from the life they knew. They were very patriotic and wished to paint outdoors and celebrate the Tuscany countryside and its people.

Serafino De Tivoli

De Tivoli, like most of the Macchiaioli, fought as a volunteer with Garibaldi. De Tivoli is considered the father of the group and in 1853 encouraged artists to meet outdoors to paint the real world and experiment with techniques and colour. In 1855, De Tivoli went to France, where he was impressed by the artists of the Barbizon School who were painting outdoors in Fontainebleau Forest outside Paris. Interestingly, the Barbizon group was inspired by the work of John Constable (1776-1837). Are you reminded of a Constable painting when you look at 'A Pasture'? Constable painted studies outdoors then worked in his studio.



Sernisi's painting seems far more spontaneous than De Tivoli's, as though Sernesi is attempting to capture the moment. The chief claim to fame of the Macchiaioli is that they were a decade ahead of the Impressionists. Unfortunately, Sernisi was killed fighting for independence aged twenty-seven.

Odoardo Borrani

The Macchiaioli artists believed that areas of light and shadow, or "macchie" (literally patches or spots) were the chief components of a work of art. They experimented with colour to contrast light and shade and to shape their subject, and fine detail became irrelevant and often neglected – a step towards Impressionism.

KILKHAMPTON JUNIOR AND INFANTS SCHOOL

By the time you read this article, the festive season will be well underway. I however am writing this on a grey November day, with December still a few weeks away.

School has been a busy place over the last month. The new building is now really progressing, the brick cladding has been completed and we have some attractive ceramic tiles in the school colours at the front of the building.

The children and staff have been hard at work and I have included a range of pictures to show what has been going on in the school. Our sports teams have again been in action locally and the children have been learning a wide range of knowledge and skills across the curriculum.

whole school learnt about Remembrance and Armistice Day and all of Key Stage Two (children aged between seven and eleven) visited the village war memorial where two house-captains laid a school wreath of poppies and a twominutes silence was observed. children then visited the church, saw the roll of honour and the Commonwealth war graves in the churchyard. The younger children held their silence in the school hall. Older pupils also made poppies to decorate the school hall to commemorate the occasion.

The Parents Teachers Association (PTA) has also been busy fundraising for the school. The children have produced designs for Christmas cards, which have then been printed for the parents to buy and we also held a sponsored aerobics session after school which was well-attended and raised over £800! The PTA and the school are currently looking at two key projects, a quiet and sensory garden where out outdoor library can be sited as well as new outdoor play equipment. Neither is cheap so the support of the parents and community is much appreciated.

With it now being mid-November, the attention of the school will now turn towards Christmas. Sadly, we are unable to use our usual venue of Penstowe for our Christmas play after many years. This means that for the first time we will have to stage separate Christmas plays for the infants and juniors and to limit tickets to a small number per family as we sadly do not have the same amount of space in the school hall!



Susanne had cut out all the pieces of paper, leaves and stems in packs ready for assembling. Some were fiddlier than others, but the results were lovely as you can see from the photo below.

An extra session was held on Thursday 2nd November to fill Christmas shoe boxes for the Samaritans Purse Appeal (see photo below). There were enough items given to fill 15 boxes. and also there were 3 bags of goodies left. All these were forwarded to the Appeal, who are grateful to receive both completed boxes and additional items.

Annual Report by the Chairman Kilkhampton Parish Council 5 June 2023

During the year, we received 51 planning applications – some were easily dealt with and some, like the Kilkhampton Common one, took a lot of time to come to a decision. We have a good relationship with the Planning Department and on a very high percentage we agree, but not all. Some applications we have to agree to differ on, because they make the final decision. Our local knowledge is important to them, especially when enforcing planning conditions. Thanks to Councillor Hambley for his work as Planning Liaison Officer. One of the planning applications was for the Pre-School building and we put a lot of time into it – unfortunately the project was cancelled.

In the past year we have had 3 Royal events, i.e. the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, Her Majesty's Funeral and the Coronation of King Charles III - each one involving the Parish Council.

We re-installed the telephone box at North Close with a defibrillator and up-graded the defibrillator at the garage. We now have 3 in the village and one at Stibb – all with Jay's Aim. They have been used in the past year.

We are working on refurbishing a room at the Grenville Rooms as a history room and document storage - thanks to Alan Hockin for his assistance with this.

We have just completed, at the third attempt, the paperwork for a lease with the Diocese of Truro for more land at Lamb Park. This has taken many months to complete. Thank you to Helen Bond for her assistance with this project. Also the sports pavilion is being redecorated, and some repairs to guttering etc. Work is due to start soon.

The play equipment in the park is being up-graded, this is taking a long time. We first allocated some money to the project in 2021. Negotiating with various suppliers and their workload is the main reason. Thank you to East Langford Solar Farm for their support in awarding a grant of £16,000 for a roundabout. Thank you to Gerald Strong for his work on this project.

We have regular meetings with Oliver Jones, from Cornwall Highways, regarding traffic problems in the village and with South West Water about water pressure in some parts of the village.

We have had some social behaviour problems reported to us and have worked with the police and others about this.

We are supporting Mr Ian Mason from North Kernow Community Housing.

We are helping the residents of Sanctuary Housing to sort out some repair and maintenance problems, with the help of Mr Shorne Tilbey. We now have a new Parish Council website, thanks to Tom Westlake from West Creative for his help, and if any businesses in the Parish wishes to enter their business details on the website in the Business Directory, they will get free advertising.

Simon DeRosa did some interesting work about Holy Wells in the Parish and this will be continued with our History Group.

This report gives an outline of what we do in a year, along with the day to day work of running the Parish, i.e. toilets, footpaths, parking and pollution problems and dealing with correspondence from all over the world about our parish — all handled professionally by our clerk, Hannah.

It does seem to take us a long time to do anything – we are all volunteers and only meet once a month. Add to that solicitors taking an age to do paperwork, and our preferred contractors being busy, the fact we have to have the money in place before we can start a job all adds to the time factor.

Public Speaking Session The Chairman began by asking Mr and Mrs Brookes if they wished to talk. They said just here to listen and observe, but thank you.

Planning Applications

1. PA23/07236 Proposal Change of Use of Christian Fellowship Hall to two dwellings Kilkhampton Christian Fellowship Kilkhampton Bude Cornwall Applicant Aquila Fellowship Trust. RH began by reiterating that we had deferred this from last month due to the planning officer could look into. RH discussed the concerns raised with

RH mentioned a couple of applications already received and previously approved. Discussed in details. For family and holiday use only. RH didn't feel any objections. Proposed approval and IH seconded. All in favour.
- 3. PA23/08024 Retrospective application to regularise the erection of machinery and wood store to maintain the land West Of Aldercombe Cottages Kilkhampton Bude Cornwall EX23 9RP. Plan read through and discussed. Numerous applications have come in already. We have refused them so far. RH proposed refusal as per previous applications and whilst enforcement order is in place. IH seconded. All in favour of refusal.
- 4. PA23/08565 Application for tree works in a Conservation Area: Reducing height of 3 x multistemmed Sycamores St James Kilkhampton Bude Cornwall EX23 9QR. RH read through and discussed. IH proposed approval and PS seconded. All in favour of approval.

Matters

- 1. Car park and Toilets: £126.30 taken. TC mentioned that the disabled toilet was still out of order. Works done but not sorted as of yet. Coin operation not working. RH mentioned another gentleman had done something before. Current gentleman to assist is unable to due to illness. TC to check on situation.
- 2. Lamb Park play area: Photos view of works done so far. A Few issues but most have been resolved. VJ met with Mr Gerald Strong and looking at funding for the other swing. IH mentioned the yellow gate still not closing properly. Under the tunnel section there was evidence of someone trying to set fire to the matting. TC felt as we are spending so much money on the area, we should invest in CCTV. VJ reiterated this seen lots of glass alcoholic bottles being left around the play areas. RH mentioned Mr Simon Finn had rung him regarding Glebe Land boundaries etc. Nothing heard as yet. RH to keep chasing.

Solar Farm money will be available again in May per the Chairman.

Reg and the whole committee wish to thank everyone who supports our special village hall.



TREE BOOK GROUP: White Tiger by Aravind Adiga

Here we follow the development of an Indian boy from a poor village. He was named simply Gunna – meaning Boy – as no-one in his family had the time to give him a real name. His teacher finally names him. However, he has changed again to Balram, leaving the old name behind like a snake leaves its skin, and has now become an entrepreneur.

Written in the form of letters, our now-adult protagonist is writing night after night to the Premier of China, in Beijing – called by him 'The Capital of the Freedom-Loving Nation of China'. He moves from being an extraordinarily-talented



scholar in his village, to an almost-slave in a tea-shop, and then to the high-rises of Delhi as a junior driver for a millionaire. However the whole family - with the roots in the same village our boy came from, plus one American spouse - see him only as a beast of burden. Only his Master has some limited form of human feelings for him. The boy sleeps in the basement with cockroaches and dreams the impossible dream. Contact with other drivers in similar situations teaches him to find a way out of this one-way street. His salary - which once rolled right into the hands of his odious grandmother in the dirty hometown – he now keeps for his way out. However, the corruption that surrounds him day by day will corrupt him too, and very soon. Now the question is: will he really be able to commit murder to realise his dreams of a free and more importantly - totally independent life? The answer comes very soon in the letters he writes from his new office, adorned with a lot of crystal chandeliers. He is very successful and plans for the future, too. However, he has lost almost all humanity and has finally become a real 'White Tiger' - mercilessly feeding on everything and everyone.

The book is an example of how a citizen is more than able to judge his 'Mother India' and the moral corruption which exists.
