

KILKHAMPTON JUNIOR AND INFANTS SCHOOL

I am writing this article at the end of the first full week back in September. The new Reception children have now been with us for just seven mornings and have settled in really well. We have also welcomed new children to the school in other year groups who have also settled in to the school. The children here are so friendly and always welcome new students and are keen to make new friends.

We have just held elections for our house and vice captains, and Mrs McGrath is just about to train our new school librarians. In the next few weeks, children will also be able to apply to become Sports Leaders, Digital Ambassadors and Mental Health Buddies.

Our new Year Six pupils are settling in well to being the oldest in the school, in this, their final year at primary school. Although the school year has just started, Year Six parents are beginning to apply for secondary school places, with children going to visit local secondary schools for their open mornings to help them with their choices.

The children have started learning their new topics for this half term, and all have a geography focus. Year Five and Six are learning about the Alps; Year Three and Four about 'Why people live near volcanoes?' and Year One and Two are learning about their immediate surroundings in a topic called, 'What is it like here?'

We are also focusing on Design and Technology this half term, with children focusing on different skills in different parts of the school – from making bridges to designing puppets linked to Little Red Riding Hood.

This month, Bude Look Group has been talking about the work of Elisabeth Frink. You may have seen her 'Horse and Rider' in Bond Street, London. She loved her horses and dogs and felt strongly that man should be at one with nature. She wished to express harmony, symbiosis, and mutual respect.



Frink was a child during the second world war, living near a military airfield in Suffolk. She watched planes falling from the sky and even huddled in a hedge to avoid machine gun fire from a German plane. It had a huge influence on her life. Her early work at the time of the Cold War and the build-up of nuclear weapons conveyed fear. The birdlike forms were jagged and hunched.

Another key subject for Frink was the masculine form: not individual personalities, heroes, or beauty but the expression of aggression, vulnerability, and pain. She saw heads as the centre of emotion and the seat of the soul.

Prisoner is reflective, distanced and cruelly marked by age and trauma. He is part of a series that describes the oppression of fascism.

Goggle Head is sinister, thuggish, the eyes hidden, the texture smooth, impermeable. He is capable of inhumanity.

Good evening to all, and apologies read through by the Chairman.

Planning Applications

1) PA24/06009 | Listed building consent for the Installation of EV Charge unit at Tithe Barn, in the curtilage of The Old Rectory. | Tithe Barn The Old Rectory Kilkhampton Bude Cornwall EX23 9QU. Discussed and no concerns. KO moved for approval and KB seconded. All in favour.

2) PA24/06223 | Replacement of small shed with garden room / store | West Cottage West Street Kilkhampton Bude Cornwall EX23 9QW. Discussed and no concerns. LB moved for approval and VJ seconded. All in favour.

3) PA24/06224 | Listed Building Consent for replacement of small shed with garden room/store West Cottage West Street Kilkhampton Bude Cornwall EX23 9QW. Discussed and no concerns. LB moved for approval and VJ seconded. All in favour.

4) PA24/05835 | Reconfiguration of existing owners accommodation and lodge and alterations for Change of use of Public House to residential use. Extension of garage into detached dwelling along with new detached dwelling in Courtyard. To total 7 residential units of accommodation without compliance with condition 2 of decision PA19/02874 dated 16.12.2019. Former The Stables Inn Penstowe Park Kilkhampton Bude Cornwall EX23 9QY. Discussed in detail. RH read through details of all plots and alterations. RH didn't feel there were any parts we could refuse on. Been going on for some time. Plans available for viewing. Planning being allowed, these are all internal. KO asked on the section re: "new attached dwelling". TC stated that the buildings are already there. TC moved for approval and RH seconded. All in agreement. Happy to go with the planning department's final decisions. No objections from Parish Council.

5) PA24/06435 Proposal Proposed conversion of games room to 2no. dwellings Location Houndapitt Farm Kilkhampton Bude Cornwall Applicant Mr A Heard. Same footprint as already there. RH discussed and no issues, pictures viewed. LB moved for approval and VJ seconded. All in favour.

6) PA24/06623 Proposal Erection of a rear conservatory Location 31 Priestacott Park Kilkhampton Bude Cornwall Applicant Rev Richard Ward-Smith. The Chairman felt no grounds to refuse. All OK. KB moved and LB seconded. All in favour.

Matters

1. Car park and Toilets: £145.40 taken. Invoice for replacement sensor and fitting received.

2. Playpark Budgeting: The Chairman informed that two seats had been purchased as mentioned in the last meeting. Invoice received. VJ talked about the quotes received previously for remaining work. Some more investigations to be done and currently unsure of the funding that will be available. VJ feels if we moved forward, we should look into the climbing frame aspect. VJ to bring more details to the next meeting. KO asked if possible to see one - as the items there already are a lot smaller than they appeared to be in the drawings. The Chairman felt if VJ can continue to keep looking into - then we will be moving forward for next year. The Chairman mentioned that the two seats need fitting. Need to be on a concrete base (large enough so that people's feet are on the concrete and not the grass). VJ felt one should be placed facing into the park by the seesaw. IH and KO to sort base and fitting and VJ to discuss placement also.

3. EV Charging: Nothing to discuss at this time. Nowhere suitable for these to be placed.

4. Rural Village Services Group: Nothing to discuss. Not for our involvement.

5. CCTV at Lamb Park: TC mentioned the costs are £99.75 each and felt we would need four. The Chairman mentioned he has seen these in operation and was extremely impressed. TC also mentioned a SIM card will be required for each one at approximately £6 each. Legally we are ok as long as we place enough signage around the areas. The Chairman asked if we need three or four. Two in the playpark and one at top gate entrance? TC said definitely need one at the car park area due to

vandalism recently. Sooner we purchase and fit the better. TC proposed purchasing four and LB seconded. All in favour. The Chairman will sort. LB happy to handle the SIM aspects. To be left on the agenda for further discussions etc. Signage needed to be sorted too.

6. Traffic Calming: The sub-committee met with Highways and discussed latest proposals. Pictures shown on screen and discussed in detail. Emails read through by the Chairman including reply from ST. Clerk to email Mr Oliver Jones accordingly – in agreement with previous email suggestions from the Parish Council from the subcommittee. All in favour of this. VJ proposed and LB seconded. Also agreeing for this to then go to consultation.

KO also had a parishioner mention to him this evening that his car had been scrapped by a vehicle hitting it and pushing it along the road. It also knocked down the post box in the process.

7. Other matters arising from the minutes: none.

Reports

Footpaths: IH mentioned second cut being done next week. RH said a parishioner had mentioned an area from Cross Cottage to the Common – IH said it has been done already and will take another look.

Playing Fields and Lamb Park: Nothing further to discuss.

School: Nothing to report per LB.

Grenville Rooms: RH said Mr Luke Francis is asking if another post box can be put outside the Grenville Rooms and if there were any objections? None from members. All in favour and RH to let Mr Francis know.

Month's work Read through and approved by all.

Members

RH went to Herdacott Farm – they have stated they need permission from the Parish Council to allow them to apply for a grant to resurface the existing concrete driveway. Clerk to write to Mr K Harvey with approval permission to reinstate the existing concrete path. (CV to pass on address to Clerk).

KB – mentioned that Mr Luke Francis had spoken about the soldier plinth – can we get galvanized bolts as the current ones bleed rust onto the plinth and it sits there. KB to look into. Another parishioner had also mentioned the use of handheld speed cameras. The Chairman felt we had done this before.

TC – suggested the car park at Lamb Park needs sorting asap.

IH – did a job at Blackberry Lane and the landowner had a sycamore tree by their fence. Continually dropping leaves and virtually dead. They had concerns if it fell onto their shed. The Chairman brought the area up on screen and it was felt that where it was would actually be the landowner's responsibility and they would need to check their deeds. IH to mention to the relevant parties.

VJ – someone had asked about the pantomime and about DBS and safeguarding. The Chairman and RH said all covered and OK.

We will be receiving a letter regarding speeding traffic around the Green at North Close. Clerk to write to Mr Oliver Jones and mention the request for traffic calming through North Close Estate (traffic visiting Atlantic View Road and Sea View). Coming off the A39 and going through passing the green at speed where children are always out playing.

LB, KO - nothing

The Chairman mentioned that JT is working on the website. The other similar website, that has been mentioned previously, is now charging for advertising – even though businesses didn't agree to their advert in the first instance.

Correspondence Email received from Openreach regarding a snapped cable. Asking for permission to repair via the Parish Council. Drawings viewed of the area. Clerk to reply stating the Parish Council are happy – however it is not their ownership. Suggest to contact the residents in the surrounding area.

Finance Read through by Chairman. Invoices to be paid: £92.25 S Gifford (litterpick); £1,721.15 D & I Bridgmans; £96.00 Michael Vanstone Plant Hire; £378.00 BDO (Audit Completion Fee); £2,341.20 David Ogilvie Engineering (benches); £98.65 K & J Building Service. All in favour to be paid.

Date of next regular meeting: 7th October 2024, 7.30pm, Grenville Rooms.

Thanks to all by the Chairman and declared the meeting closed.

TREE BOOK GROUP:

TOMORROW AND TOMORROW AND TOMORROW by Gabrielle Zevin

Tomorrow and Tomorrow and Tomorrow is the story of Sadie and Sam, two best friends and gamers, who go on to make video games together and become business partners. The story spans over thirty years; years that bring them success, but also failures, trials and heartache, their friendship having its ups and downs, but always enduring.

This is in truth a hard book to describe, and not being at all into video games, makes it even harder. However, this book is about so much more than gaming, and can see why it is so popular.

At its heart it is a story about friendship, but also about the making and power of art in general and the possibilities of our imagination. It also tackles some weighty themes, including disability, depression, grief and trauma of various kinds, and in a way that never felt too heavy-handed. The characters were diverse, and race and identity were handled well.

The book had a feeling of nostalgia given that the main bulk of the story takes place in the 90s/2000s, and overall the story felt unique. It also takes you on a roller-coaster of emotions, in that you feel the highs and lows that both Sadie and Sam experience across the years.

The lives of the two main characters are often messy, and they are both deeply flawed. Likeable as both of them are, particularly as the story went on, it did sometimes feel as if they didn't really show much development, but rather repeated the same patterns of behaviour, displaying their immaturity and self-centredness.

Marx was undoubtedly a favourite character, and the book probably wouldn't have been the same without him. As much as there is a special connection between Sadie and Sam, Marx often felt like the glue that held them together, both on a personal and professional level. He was always there quietly doing so much, without ever taking any of the credit or causing any drama, and that, together with his optimistic outlook on life and how much he loved the two of them, just made him a really endearing character.

The details of the creative process of making games was interesting, and in particular the recurring theme of the endless possibilities they provide. "What is gaming?" Marx said. "It's tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow. It's the possibility of infinite rebirth, infinite redemption. The idea that if you keep playing you could win. No loss is permanent, because nothing is permanent, ever." Some of the favoured parts of the story were when Sadie and Sam and Marx are first making Ichigo, as that seemed to be them at their happiest and most creative, before their first experience of success and fame, and perhaps as such at their purest, before petty resentments and insecurities and jealousies start kicking in.

There were parts in the middle that dragged a bit, however, then something unexpected and truly shocking happened that really draws you back into the story, and perhaps was the part that hit the hardest. After that the story did then seem to get a big weaker again in that these were the parts which didn't connect as well to either Sadie or Sam, though the ending itself did seem to come back full circle to the beginning, which fitted in with the theme of pressing the start button and trying over again. There were some more experimental type chapters here and there, that sometimes worked and sometimes didn't.
