EDITORIAL



Hi everyone - dydh da pubonan!

I think we can say the summer weather is well and truly over! Although still warm (ish!) In the daytime, it soon gets cold in the evenings! We were hoping to have one last weekend away in our van, but the thought of being huddled indoors from about 6pm doesn't appeal to me, it's supposed to be all about enjoying the outdoors! Let's hope there is time for one more heatwave this year - maybe in November?

Anyway, there's plenty of gardening still to do plus a bit of decorating, alongside of course maintaining our social life!

I was talking to someone the other day about why Red Post is red. If you are locals, you may know the reason, or at least the beliefs about it. But there also seems to be some debate about the truth.

In a nutshell, according to folklore, red posts were the sites of gallows, with many hangings held there. Alongside this are stories of bodies being left to rot as a reminder of how crimes will be punished. There are also stories of witches and people who committed suicide being buried at crossroads as local parishes would have nothing to do with their burial. An article on Launcells Parish Council website states that the last hanging at Red Post was sometime in the 1800s, for the crime of stealing sheep.

However – although I believe our Red Post is the only one in Cornwall, there are others – at least 4 in Dorset. Local history suggests that one of the Dorset red posts was definitely not the site of the local gallows. Other suggestions include the posts having significance in the transport of prisoners, used to direct the guards to places where prisoners could be held overnight on their journey. There is also a suggestion that red posts are sited at significant crossroads or coach stops.

Whatever the truth is, our Red Post has been marked on maps for over 200 years. And of course, none of the ideas put forward here may be true, or I might possibly have misunderstood some of the information I found. If anyone can add to this story, it would make interesting reading in future editions!

FROM REV RICHARD

We live in the countryside and our village is surrounded by farms and farmers. We owe them a lot. So put your hands together and let's hear it for farmers!

The popular image of a farmer is that of a stolid man or woman, not easily angered – except when the Government tries to bite the hand that feeds them and quite rightly they bung up the roads to Parliament with tractors. It takes a lot of desperation for them to be moved in that way. For many a farmer, it is a very lonely life, living on his acres with only his beasts for company. Or enclosed in a tractor all day. Their only respite being when they meet their mates at market or at agricultural shows.

From time immemorial, plagues continue to sweep through cows, pigs, sheep and chickens. And this year's drought is thought to set back produce considerably, but so far, so far, there has never been a corn failure. The dogged skill of the farmer accepts and reacts to what is thrown at him – the good and the bad. And we are lucky that he does.

And so the wheel of the year changes, with the length and light of the days altering as we are blessed with different seasons. And so with

summer almost over and autumn approaching, we celebrate the changing patterns of the countryside and the beauty of nature and wildlife, with the celebration of Harvest. And so we should! Good evening to all by the Chairman.

Minutes Approved by all and to be signed by the Chairman at the end of the meeting.

Vacancy Applications

Thanks to all that have put themselves forward and for taking such an interest in the parish. We only have one position available. Applicants to be seen one at a time, other applicants and FE to leave the room. Then, a secret ballot conducted by the clerk. In the event of a tie, the Chairman would have a second vote. Applicants and FE left the room.

Mrs Lorna Curtis remained and read through her application letter. Mrs Curtis stated that she was happy to stand down due to not being in the village long. Wanted to put herself forward just in case there were no other parties interested. Asked if any questions. None from the councillors. Thanks to Mrs Curtis from the Chairman and all councillors. Mrs Curtis left the room and Mr Martin Cross entered.

Mr Cross also read through his application letter and why he would like to be a part of the parish council. No questions for Mr Cross and thanks again from the Chairman and all councillors. Mr Cross left the room and Mr Martin Brennan entered.

Mr Brennan talked through his application letter and also why he felt he would benefit the council and his interest in the village etc. Mr Brennan left the room.

Unfortunately a fourth applicant Mrs Victoria Skinner was unable to attend.

A secret ballot then took place. Private votes had also been received by KB and JT. All were counted by the clerk. The Chairman called the applicants and FE back into the room, and thanked everyone once again for applying, and welcomed Mr Martin Brennan onto the Parish Council. Thanks to the Council by Mr Brennan. The Chairman also stated that everyone is welcome to stay for the duration of the meeting.

Applications

1. PA26/04477 7 August 2026 Erection of steel open covered 3-bay portal frame and roof Location Applicant Grid Ref Heatham Kilkhampston Bude

Cornwall D W Nancekivell. RH visited the site however there was nobody around at the time. Talked through briefly. We don't get much say on agricultural buildings. RH didn't feel this would be a problem. TC felt necessary for legalities. TC proposed approval and PS seconded. All in favour.

2. PA26/05366 Construction of two agricultural covered yards Location Applicant Grid Ref North Park Halls Farm Stibb Road Bude Mr & Mrs Drew. RH spoke to Mr Drew. This is a covered area to stop dirty water running away. KO proposed approval and LB seconded. All in favour.

3. PA26/05367 Construction of two agricultural covered yards and hard surfaced yard. North Park Halls Farm Stibb Road Bude Cornwall EX23 9HN As above This is a covered area to stop dirty water running away. Again, KO proposed approval and LB seconded. All in favour.

4. PA26/05875 Replacement Agricultural Barn Adjacent To Uplands Kilkhampston Bude Cornwall Applicant Grid Ref Mr Davis. Replacement barn. RH hasn't visited. Described location and talked through. Nothing we can object to. IH proposed approval and RH seconded. All in favour.

Matters

1. Car park and toilets: £226.60 taken due to the increase in charge. TC feels it may also help with the vandalism. TC mentioned we were thinking of decorating them. KO to quote for the works, our recommendation is anything under £2000 we can allocate as a Parish Council.

2. Open Space Funding: Form to complete. We are looking into a multi-use games area (MUGA), like the one on the Bovis estate in Bude. The Chairman mentioned he has spoken to the company we have used previously and the online prices don't include flooring. The gentleman is happy to come here from Milton Keynes when back from his holiday and to quote on our requirements etc. To get quotes and then decide how we move forward. Lots of discussions to be held for the benefit of the form – this is the type of plan we are aiming for. Numerous councillors to attend the meeting with the company. The funding offered to us is from Bunnyhomes.

3. Bench at Co-op: Ordered and fitted. Same as the others in the village (6 overall), maintenance-free and long lasting. Invoice received to be approved and paid.

4. Other matters arising from the minutes: None

Reports

Footpaths: Cornwall Council have completed the bridge at Aldercombe/Taylor's Cross. Pictures shown. Great bridge and steps, although IH felt it still needs a handrail. Stile in a distressed state, not

useable per the Chairman. Stile from Taylors Cross also needs replacing. IH said the one at Kespit was also completely gone. Cornwall Council supplied the materials for that one and we fitted it. Chairman asking if this is still the case? Their materials are much better. The footpath is still closed with our notices. Both stiles are dangerous. FE to ask if they will supply the materials. IH wondered if they had taken note of this stile and are coming back? Chairman to email FE pictures with the new bridge and stile that needs replacing. FE to check in with relevant people on our behalf. Once these stiles are replaced this gold footpath will be open again. TC mentioned it is a struggle to get through the end of Aldercombe Lane after the second stile to the gate of the field. IH to look into this and from Barn Lane to sewers.

Playing fields and Lamb Park: KO worked on 2 steel poles that hold the crossbeam for the roof of the shelter. De-rusted etc, treated and painted. Large swings and small frame with monkey bars need doing. Also the shelter needs some attention to the outside. To be on February agenda. KO to look into new cameras which would avoid any ongoing costs as they work on a different basis. Lighting system to be looked into also by KO.

The Chairman stated that the other dead tree had now been removed. MV Plant invoice received and to be approved and paid.

School: Went back today, nothing to report per LB.

Grenville Rooms: Nothing to report per RH.

Month's work All ok.

Members

RH – Email from Mr Luke Francis – taking the chains down, wanted somewhere to store them before painting. Chairman sorting up at Wayside.

RH asked FE regarding when the Bunnyhomes footpath will be completed. FE said the agreement still have not been finalised with the Council. The Chairman felt it should be done by the end of the year. LB asked if we can call Mr Will Morris. Chairman to call and ask the questions. FE to also try her contact on our behalf.

RH had received a note from KB asking why the 20mph sign didn't begin at North Close. FE felt it was due to where the road narrows. Chairman stated we all had the details originally.

Also asked about the footpath at the Common now that it has been given to the National Trust. Still our footpath. They can't block it and don't have to maintain it. It is our responsibility.

IH – Asked if we are moving the soldier back? Yes – hopefully sort this week. Not easy to keep moving around.

KO – Manhole near the New Inn is really rattling and

another one 50 yards down by the Co-op. Both done not long ago too. FE took notes.

A parishioner asked who cleans the guttering on the pavement from the New Inn to the Co-op? Lots of grass in there. FE too notes and to ask.

LB, TC, PS – Nothing

FE – Visited Stratton Hospital with other local councillors and League of Friends. Very impressive and we're very lucky to have it and all the staff.

Asked regarding the Neighbourhood Priority Statement – the Chairman said it's an impressive document that St Day have. Questioned its overall enforcement power in the end. The last one we took time and effort over held no weight at all. FE said the Council should assist and made it much easier and shorter. LB felt any developer would just question it. The Chairman felt we still wouldn't have any final say and it also puts pressure on whose land we agree/disagree with etc. Asked if anyone wanted to take on this task. No from all councillors. The Chairman said the larger councils have the money and professionals to take this on. FE confirmed that at the moment we would rather not. To relay that it's too long and complicated for such a small Parish. Chairman once again reiterated that last time we had a great amount of help, produced a great Parish Plan but still with no effect.

The Chairman said we have received a formal request from the Air Ambulance for some funding. Our policy is a "no donations" one. Clerk to reply stating that we hold numerous events etc in the village for the Air Ambulance.

The Chairman mentioned we have talked about putting a Defibrillator at the Grenville Rooms and said that JaysAim have offered to fund 50% of the costs. Clerk to reply to accept their generous offer. IH asked if we should all have training? KO said they offer a free training session in which they bring the actual type of defibrillator we are purchasing to demonstrate on. LB asked if the relevant school members could also attend training. Yes per KB.

KILKHAMPTON JUNIOR AND INFANTS SCHOOL

I am writing this article at the end of the first full week back in September. The new Reception children have now been with us for just five mornings and have settled in really well. We have also welcomed new children to the school in other year groups who have also settled in to the school. The children here are so friendly and always welcome new students and are keen to make new friends.

We have dropped from six to five classes this year and so our organisation is slightly different. We have a Reception and Year One class; a Year One and Two Class; a Year Three and Four class; a Year Four and Five class and a Year Five and Six class.

We are just about to hold elections for our house and vice-captains, Mrs McGrath is just about to train our new school librarians, and Mrs Watkins and Mrs Cook will be training our Sports Leaders. In the next few weeks children will also be able to apply to become Environmental Reps, Digital Ambassadors and Mental Health Buddies. Our new Year Six pupils are settling in well to being the oldest in the school, in this their final year at primary school. Although the

school year has just started, Year Six parents are beginning to apply for secondary school places, with children going to visit local secondary schools for their open mornings to help them with their choices.

The children have started learning their new topics for this half term. Children in Key Stage Two (Years Three to Six) are learning about the Anglo-Saxon settlement. Children in Key Stage One and Reception are learning 'All about me.' There are also many other subjects being studied including design technology, art and music plus many others, as well as the core subjects of English, maths and science.
